# ABOUT THE PROJECT AND PROGRAMME

The project “The European Union – Yesterday, Today, Tomorrow” aims to raise awareness of the history of the European Union and to show the benefits of EU membership, especially for young people. Thanks to the participation of organizations from countries with different experience of European integration (Italy – founding member), Poland (member since 2004), North Macedonia (candidate country), young people will learn about different perspectives of integration and approaches to the Union itself. What is equally important, our actions will not take place in large cities but in smaller locations, so we can reach people who have limited access to information.

A number of actions are planned under the project: 3 events entitled “EU Festival” in each partner country with debates; table discussions; European workshops for young people; the European Union knowledge contest and the presentation of youth works. In addition to young people, representatives of all partner countries, external experts, local authorities, lecturers and seniors will participate in the meetings.

A conference summarizing the project will be held at the end of the project. The works prepared by young people in the “I-European” competition will be the primary result of its implementation. All works will be translated into English and presented on the Internet websites. Winners of individual competitions will go abroad to specific events with partners. In addition a brochure summarizing the project will be produced at the end of the project. It will be sent to the most important people and institutions of culture, local authorities, politicians, etc.



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Europe for Citizens is an EU grant programme supporting non-governmental organisations and municipalities, and other non-profit organisations/institutions active in the field of civil society, culture and education, in the implementation of civil society projects, local initiatives on social engagement, democratic participation and European remembrance.

Aims of the Programme:

- to contribute to citizens' understanding of the EU, its history and diversity
- to foster European citizenship and to improve conditions for civic and democratic participation at EU level
- to raise awareness of remembrance, common history and values

# DAY 1 & 2

### DAY 1

The first day of the visit was intended for the arrival of participants to Starachowice, accommodation at the Senator Hotel and a welcome dinner there, attended by all guests, hosts and young people from the Youth City Council in Starachowice. It was a great opportunity for the first conversations and getting to know each other. Additionally, after the dinner, the coordinators met to discuss the agenda and project management issues, financial matters, timetable and risk analysis. The date of the visit to Italy (July 7-10, 2022) was confirmed, the agenda of the debate during the 2nd day and the workshops on the 3rd day were thoroughly discussed. The last expectations from the participants were collected so that the substantive input was as valuable as possible. Particular attention was paid to the accessibility of the events for young people and the greatest possible interaction with participants, so that they were not boring and difficult formats. Questions for the knowledge contest about the European Union on the Kahoot platform were also consulted. The meeting was also an opportunity to evaluate the works that contributed to the "I European" competition, in which the winner will travel to another trip to Italy.

### DAY 2

## 9:00

The event was started by the **Deputy Mayor of Starachowice - Marcin Gołębiowski** with a short welcome and thanks to the young people and residents who came in large numbers to the City Hall to talk about the future of the European Union, in particular in the present times of crisis - war in Ukraine, pandemic, growth of nationalist movements and the impending economic crisis. Deputy of Mayor emphasized the importance of such initiatives and talks and the creation of platforms for cooperation between different countries and various people - from young people to seniors.

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*I am very glad that you meet in the City Hall in Starachowice, a medium-sized city, where there is rarely an opportunity to talk in international group, but I assure you that our Office is and will be open to cooperation and discussion at the European level. Thank you and I wish you interesting conclusions. "*

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Then it was time for a short Presentation of Partners - Project Leader - Association Reflections on Europe was presented by President of the Board - Kamil Stanos, ETV Euro Treviso - Daniela Susarenco and Association Youth on Board - Jovan Necovski.

Kamil Stanos also presented project and Europe for Citizens Programme.

Background for discussion was introduced by our special guest from European Commission Representative in Poland from Warsaw - **Juan-Luis Ballesteros**. It was a very important part to show our mostly-young audience the most important challenges that EU faced right now. Juan-Luis diagnosed couple of issues:- security - war in Ukraine, terrorism, threat from China- health - mainly the covid-19 pandemic, but also diseases of affluence and aging of societies- energy - energy crisis, high energy prices, gas shortages, etc.- European integration - Ukraine, Moldova, Balkan countries- European values - the rule of law, tolerance, respect for human rights, equality, freedom, democracy, respect for human dignity. Considering the above issues, it is very important to cooperate at the European and supra-European level (e.g. at the NATO defense level) and strive for the greatest possible solidarity between nations, because only by acting together can we reduce crises and problems.



*Thank you very much for the invitation and I am very curious about the conclusions of this meeting, the more that these voices will come from young people. I often hear the saying that youth is our future. Nowadays, this perception needs to be changed, youth is our present and we all work together for a good future.*



Then we passed the voice to the audience using MENTIMETER tool. We asked the question what is your first association with the European Union and these were our results:

Then it was time for a debate with experts led by Dominika Chmielewska - youth activist, member of ROE and former President of the Youth City Council in Starachowice.

The debate was attended by:

- Jovan Necovski - Association Youth on Board
- Daniela Susarenco - ETV Euro Treviso
- Joanna Jendrońska - Robert Schuman Foundation
- Katarzyna Gruszko - Jan Kochanowski University

We started with Joanna Jendrońska to present a brief genesis of the European Union as she represents the Schuman Foundation, we started with the Schuman Declaration, Europe Day that we celebrate on May 9, the Treaties of Rome of 1957.

Taking advantage of the fact that we hosted 3 European countries with different experience in European integration, we asked our guests about the perspective of each country - Italy - as the founding country of the European Coal and Steel Community - the progenitor of the EU, Poland, which joined the EU during the great enlargement in 2004, who in May 2022 turned 18 in the EU, and North Macedonia - a country that has been a candidate country for the EU for several years.

### POLISH PERSPECTIVE

The Polish perspective was presented by Katarzyna Gruszko, recalling the uncertainty during the accession referendum, sharing interesting anecdotes and emphasizing the unquestionable benefits for Poland and the civilization leap that took place thanks to EU funds and joining the common market and the Schengen area. She assessed that the presence in the EU is a reason of state for Poland, without which we would not be where we are.

There are also some problematic issues, including the problem of the rule of law and solidarity during the refugee crisis. Rule of law undoubtedly is a problem that must be resolved as quickly as possible. It is necessary to educate the society and raise awareness of the importance of the rule of law, which is one of the European values, without which, for example, an ordinary citizen may have problems in everyday life. As for the refugee crisis, Poland proved its empathy and efficient management during the influx of refugees from Ukraine after the invasion of the Russian Federation.

The following degradation of Poland's position in the European Union is worrying, which does not reflect the moods prevailing in the country among the society, which overwhelmingly supports the European Union - we will return to these data later. Another issue to be solved in the future is the adoption of a common currency - with the impending global crisis it is of key importance

### ITALIAN PERSPECTIVE

Italy, as a country that is in the community for the longest time, has a different perspective, and the biggest problem and challenge lies in the rise of Eurosceptic moods and nationalist movements, which are more and more visible. Before 2018, Italy based its European policy on close cooperation with France and Germany. They complied with the recommendations of the European Commission regarding the reduction of the budget deficit and tried to solve the problem of migration at the Community level. The advantage for Italy was the wide representation of Italian politicians and officials in the EU institutions and the influence on their functioning. However, the ineffectiveness of Italy's economic and migration policy led to a rise in Eurosceptic sentiment in society, which influenced the outcome of the 2018 elections. The new government of the M5S and the League challenged the approach of its predecessors, abandoning austerity policies and tightening up migration policy without consulting with EU partners. These actions led to disputes in the European arena and increased distrust of Italians towards the EU.

It is worth quoting here data on support from member states to the European Union. Based on the data from February 2022, Poland is the most Euro-enthusiastic nation with 82% support, Italy - 66%, which is below the EU average (70%). As far as North Macedonia is concerned, about 60% of the society supports joining the EU, but as Jovan emphasized - unfortunately this percentage is falling every year due to large deviations that the country made (e.g., changing the name of the country due to the conflict with Greece ) and the protracted procedure. North Macedonia has been a candidate country since 2005.

### NORTH MACEDONIAN PERSPECTIVE

Apart of the dispute with Greece about the name in November 2020, Bulgaria effectively blocked the official start of North Macedonia's EU Accession Negotiations over what it perceives as slow progress on the implementation of the 2017 Friendship Treaty between the two countries, state-supported or tolerated hate speech, and minority claims towards Bulgaria.

North Macedonia is one of seven current EU candidate countries, together with Albania, Moldova, Montenegro, Serbia, Turkey and Ukraine.

The important thing about being candidate country is North Macedonia can participate in some EU Programms such as Erasmus+ or Europe for Citizens, which is so important for young generation and building approval among them.

# 11:00

Between the experts' statements, Dominika asked the audience short questions such as: when Poland joined the EU, which countries joined the European Union during the great enlargement, whether they know any European Italian politician, etc. The reward for the correct answer was a small gadget each time.

### MENTIMETER

An interesting solution used by us during the debate was the use of the mentimeter tool, thanks to which the participants could ask questions to experts on a regular basis. This way, 17 questions were submitted, which the experts also had to deal with, and additionally, the participants could evaluate the questions.

Questions:

1. Can young people influence the activities of the European Union?
2. What the Europe would be like without the EU?
3. Is the future of the European Union in the hands of young people?
4. What do you think about Macedonia joining in the European Union and the argument with Bulgaria?
5. What are the plans of the European Union for next year?
6. When did Poland join EU and were there any things Poland needed to change to join EU?
7. Which countries could join the UE in the future?
8. Is it possible that there will be any new members of the UE soon?
9. Which country has the biggest contribution to the European Union?
10. Does the European Union have clear plans about providing help to fight post-conflict poverty and humanitarian crisis in Ukraine?
11. Do you think Ukraine will be in the European Union after war?
12. Is more political leadership and visionary of the European institutions possible? Or will this field always be contested by the states?
13. Why some of countries don't want to join the UE?
14. Why so few people from Poland are in managerial positions in the European Union?
15. Whether UK's decision to leave the EU was a good for them and us?
16. Do you see European Union developing even more in the future?
17. What is the future in Europe for the other refugees (not from Ukraine)?

Unfortunately, due to time constraints, we could not ask all these questions on the forum, however, the topics provided by the participants were used during the break talks and world cafe discussions.

# 12:30

### WORLD CAFE DISCUSSIONS

Then came the world cafe discussions led by Michał Sek from the Bronisław Geremek Foundation. Michał divided the participants into 3 tables - 1. Poland 2. Italy 3. North Macedonia. Each table had two moderators - an expert and a youth volunteer. And so the Polish table was represented by Katarzyna Stepniewska from the Europe Direct contact point in Kielce and Olga Cukierska from the Youth City Council in Starachowice, the table from North Macedonia was represented by Jovan and David Iliev from the Association youth on Board, and Italy by Simona with Amanda.

Of course, all discussions took place in English, which was an added value for the participants who practiced the foreign language in practice. The questions for each table were the same: what the European Union has given / can give to your country and what you can do to support the EU in the local community. Every 20 minutes, the participants changed tables to collect as many votes as possible and allow them to express their opinion for each country. It was also a great opportunity to network and exchange experiences.

### MAIN RECOMMENDATIONS AND CONCLUSIONS:

- more European education in schools
- visits to European institutions in Brussels or Strasbourg should be compulsory for every young person
- The European Union should put more emphasis on education in small towns and villages, where the EU offer does not reach or is not properly communicated- the problem with Euroscepticism is noticed in all countries
- only the degree of severity differs, it is a problem that requires an urgent response from national governments and the European Commission
- it is very important to network and build interpersonal relations at the European level so that young people feel part of the community
- Poland's problem with the European Union at the international level is visible, which is commented on in European countries - Klaudia gave an interesting perspective, who said that such meetings and youth exchanges show that Poland is not at all Eurosceptic and there are no such views as created by the authorities in Poland
- young people are ambassadors of openness in the European Union and, perhaps on a small scale, show a different perspective- young people have much more liberal / leftist views and in the vast majority support the EU, this must be used
- problem with North Macedonia and approval for the EU - change of name, problem with language with Bulgaria - many sacrifices make people wonder if they are losing their identity in favor of joining the EU
- the large emigration of young people from North Macedonia does not help to tone down the mood- Poland, as a country that directly borders the war in Ukraine, is the most vulnerable to attacks by Russia - there is a visible decrease in the sense of security among the inhabitants.

# DAY 3



First part of the 3rd day of our meeting was dedicated to the workshop.

Young people from Starachowice, Italy and North Macedonia met together to talk about the European Union.

The workshop is based on sharing the experience, making discussions and learning from each other. The young people had the opportunity to deepen their knowledge about the EU, but also to express their opinion and talk about their perspective for the future of the European Union.

The meeting was hosted by the irreplaceable Piotr Kaczyński - an expert on European Union affairs, a representative of the Geremek Foundation.

There were talks and short lectures explaining the most important issues. In addition, young people had the opportunity to work in international groups, together reflecting on what the European Union is doing for us and what we can do for the EU. Throughout the training, young people focused on the perspective of 3 countries: Poland, Italy and North Macedonia, exchanging their experiences and perspectives.

In the beginning our youth had a chance to get acquainted with each other and introduce themselves. They came with ideas for energizing and get-to-know games. After a small introduction the group was divided into small groups which was used for making a more comfortable environment for the discussion. Young people were asked to share their opinion about EU values, the one that is the most important for them and other people their age. After this discussion they have been asked a very important question - „What does the EU do for us, young people?. They share their vision of the EU in a group, making posters which include their ideas to after some time share it to the rest of a group and comparing ideas of all.

As a next, much important point youngsters focused on the next question: „What we can do for the EU?”. It was an extremely interesting discussion about how we can help the EU, how to share information around our friends and other citizens of our cities and countries.

At one of the last points, young people were invited to have a debate. They focus on a perspective of three countries - Italy, North Macedonia and Poland. Talking about differences and similarities between those countries, they conclude it with a thought that „even we are on a different stage of being a part of EU, we are all the same people and we all want to understand this for the others”
